## **Assistant Chief of Operations and Training**

#### **Position Summary**

The Assistant Chief of Operations and Training is responsible to manage all operational and training initiatives of the department. Reporting to the Fire Chief, this position is responsible for day-to-day management of fire and rescue services which include fire suppression operations and training and development functions. Serves as a Deputy Director of Emergency Management.

#### **Essential Functions**

#### 1. Fire Suppression and Emergency Response

- Formulates response strategies in accordance with predetermined standards; determines the nature of the incident and facilitates the plan of action; assigns staff to specific tasks.
- Fills incident management roles as necessary, as assigned, and/or as required/outlined by department policies or procedures at fire, medical, hazardous materials, technical rescue and/or largescale emergencies until relieved by a higher command authority.
- Performs structure and wildland fire suppression, ventilation, rescue, salvage, overhaul, extrication, emergency medical support, hazardous materials response and other emergency response functions.
- Responds to hazardous material emergencies; identifies potential hazardous materials situation; determines strategy for dealing
  with incident; follows evacuation procedures, including the proper handling of contaminated patients; supports mitigation and
  decontamination activities.
- Performs rescue efforts and determines tactics to use while ensuring the safety of all rescue personnel and observers; participates in search operations and enters hazardous environments; administers appropriate techniques to accomplish rescue.
- Manages, directs, leads, supervises, and coordinates special programs, teams and functions assigned under the operations division.
- Ensures the investigation of all fires as outlined by department policy and state statute.
- Maintains department in a continual state of readiness in order to effectively deal with emergencies.

#### 2. Department Operations

- Assists in planning, organizing, and administering the activities of the department.
- Prepares work schedules. Maintains and enforces discipline.
- Participates in personnel selection, development, and promotion.
- Provides technical assistance and interprets policy.
- Assists in establishing the goals and objectives of the department. Organizes the departmental operations to meet goals and objectives. Evaluates the organizational structure and methods of service delivery. Recommends changes as necessary.
- Performs research and development for uniform fire reporting systems, physical fitness training, day-to-day operations, safety, and other areas as required.
- Responds to multi-alarm and other incidents. Assumes command as required. Coordinates with other city agencies at incident scenes.
- Reviews emergency response records and reports. Initiates changes and submits reports to the state.
- Assists the chief with special projects as assigned. Researches data essential for budget preparation. Makes presentations to groups and organizations.
- Acts in the absence of the fire chief.
- Assumes command at fire scenes and directs the response teams. Serves as liaison between the department and other city leaders during significant incidents.
- Monitors expenses and looks for opportunities to drive greater cost efficiency.
- Supervises all paid on-call officers and firefighters.

#### 3. Department Training

- Develops short- and long-term training plans to ensure adequate and well-trained response to calls for the entire spectrum of emergency service calls.
- Ensures all firefighters meet or exceed state and federal standards for their respective positions.
- Establishes department standards and policies related to training. Addresses individual or team performance issues.
- Facilitates significant incident debriefings, identifies areas of improvements, and implements subsequent changes.
- Develops short-and- long term objectives to ensure the long-term safety and education of residents and business owners.
- Develops annual training and prevention budgets, works collaboratively with command staff on department budget and
  participates in the capital planning process. Negotiates contracts for related services or materials on behalf of the department.
- Develops fire department leadership by establishing training and officer enrichment goals and objectives, monitoring performance, and providing regular feedback and coaching.



#### 4. Performs other essential job duties.

- Regular and timely work attendance
- Follows all safety procedures
- Participates in fire and safety training

#### Required Knowledge, Skills, and Abilities

- Knowledge in all facets of the National Incident Management System.
- Knowledge of firefighting equipment practices, principles, methods, and techniques utilized in modern fire suppression.
- Skilled in performing Incident Command/Safety Officer responsibilities at emergency scenes.
- Skilled in Fire Apparatus Driver Operator (FADO).
- Skilled in providing work direction; identifies attributes of team members.
- Skilled in assigning tasks based on employee strengths and experience.
- Skilled in motivating direct reports, project members and a team; invites input and encourages contribution.
- Ability to perform as Deputy Emergency Management Director.
- Ability to efficiently use MS Office and other database management software.
- Ability to conduct and coordinate a wide variety hands-on and online fire training courses.
- Ability to communicates clearly and concisely both in writing and in person.
- Ability to handle stress & remain calm under pressure even under unexpected circumstances
- Ability to plan, organize, analyze problems and identify alternative solutions, project consequences of proposed actions and implement recommendations in support of goals.
- Ability to work with control sensitive and confidential information.
- Ability to gather and analyze facts to make sound recommendations.
- Ability to plan, initiate, and complete work assignments with a minimum of direction.

#### **Minimum Qualifications**

- Associates degree in Fire Science, Fire Administration or related field.
- Seven years of experience working on a fire department of a similar size.
- Fire department rank of Captain or higher.
- MN Emergency Management certification within 6 months of hire.
- Local Hazard Zone (Blue Card) Certified within 6 months of hire.
- MN State Certified First Responder
- Certified NFPA 1001 Firefighter I & II, NFPA 1041 Fire Instructor I and NFPA 1021 Fire Officer I
- Completed National Incident Management System (NIMS) course IS 100, IS 200, and IS 700
- Licensed Fire Fighter by the state of Minnesota or ability to obtain within 6 months of hire Certified Minnesota State Emergency Medical Technician.
- Valid driver's license with good driving record.

#### **Preferred Qualifications**

- Bachelor's degree in fire science or related field
- Management experience in supervision, administration, and training
- ICS/NIMS Certification

### **Elk River Fire Department**

The Elk River Fire Department has a rich history in this community. With its formal inception dating back to 1881, ERFD proudly serves the City of Elk River, the City of Otsego, and a portion of Big Lake Township. It serves a total population of approximately 35,000 and 66 square miles of fire coverage area.

ERFD is led by a full time fire chief who reports directly to the city administrator. Staff reporting to the fire chief includes a full time Assistant Chief of Operations and Training, Deputy Chief of Administration, Deputy Chief of Community Risk Reduction and an Administrative Assistant. Each Elk River Fire Station has a captain(s) and lieutenant(s) chosen from within the department after completion of an Officer Development Program. The department's Technical Rescue Team and Honor Guard are hallmarks of the department's commitment to the community.

The department has two state of the art fire stations to effectively serve the citizens. Station 1 is located at 415 Jackson Avenue and Station 2, built in 2003, is co-located with the city's public safety building at 13073 Orono Parkway. To meet service needs, Station 3 is in architectural design and projected to be operational by 2022. The Fire Department works closely with a non-profit ambulance service that is located at Station 1 and numerous firefighters serve as emergency medical technicians for the ambulance service.

Elk River Fire Department is a prevention oriented department, with five full time staff members, and 45 on-call employees. In keeping with the prevention oriented theme of ERFD, public outreach and education on fire safety is a top priority. The department also holds an annual regional fire academy for new firefighters in Elk River and the surrounding communities with the goal of graduating firefighters to carry forward a tradition of excellence.

In 2018, the department was recognized as WCCO Viewers' Choice "Best Fire Department in Minnesota."
















# **ERFD** Organizational Chart

### **About Our Community**

Elk River is located just 35 miles northwest of Minneapolis-St. Paul between the Twin Cities and St. Cloud on the Mississippi River. As the Sherburne County Seat, the city covers an area of 44 square miles making it one of the largest land-based cities in the state and the largest city within the county with nearly 25,000 residents. For over 20 years, Elk River neighborhoods have organized Night to Unite block-parties, with a record-setting 65 parties in 2019.
